- CLOVERBUDS: 1-3 minutes. "Show and Tell." Use of Visual (poster/prop) is recommended
- ILLUSTRATED TALK: Use of visual aids to talk about a topic. Recommended for beginners. Good for all Ages
- DEMONSTRATION: Show how to do or make something. Recommended for beginners. Good for all Ages
- SPEECH: Deliver an original speech intended to persuade, motivate or inform the audience. good choice for ages 12+ who have done Demonstrations & Illustrated Talks
- DRAMATIC INTERPRETATION: Re-enact a piece of scripted material individually or in a team. Good choice for ages 12+ who have done Demonstrations & Illustrated Talks
- RECITATION: Recite a pre-written work using vocal inflection & body language. Good Choice for ages 12+ who have done Demonstrations & Illustrated Talks
- IMPROMPTU: Ready for a challenge? Pull a topic from a hat & use 20 minutes to prepare a presentation. Great choice for ages 13+ who have at least 2 years of experience in public presentations.
- COLLEGE OR JOB INTERVIEW: Prepare a resume & engage in a simulated interview process. Great choice for ages 14+ who would like practice & feedback before a real interview.

Public Presentations OR Horse Communications are 1 of the eligibility requirements for the 2A/3A Award Trips along with one other County Wide Event.

****ATTENTION ALL HEMLOCK FAIR 4-H ANIMAL EXHIBITORS****

Pre-Fair Educational Activity Requirement

All Dairy & Livestock and Small Animal exhibitors exhibiting at the Hemlock Fair are **required to complete one 45-minute animal-related educational activity by July 1st**. Cloverbuds are exempt:

- This requirement is for all members exhibiting at least one of the following species: Rabbit, Cavy, Poultry (Fancy & Meat Birds), Dairy, Beef, Goat, Sheep, or Swine
- Only 1 activity required regardless of the number of species being exhibited
- Failure to complete this requirement on time will result in forfeit of all fair animal premiums for the species listed above
- An activity can include any of the following:
 1. Any Livingston County 4-H Animal Activity Night participated in during current 4-H Year
 2. Participation in the Livingston County 4-H Public Presentation Program (**MUST be an animal-related presentation**)
 3. Any county, regional, state or Cornell University-sponsored 4-H animal science activities
 4. Independent 4-H animal activity pre-approved by a 4-H educator. A completed Pre-Fair Educational Activity Form must be completed and submitted with this option. Form may be found at <http://celivingstoncounty.org/resources/pre-fair-educational-activity-form>. Examples may include researching an animal-related topic of interest, attending an animal show, participating in a hands-on animal experience with a knowledgeable adult, watching videos/presentations on raising/showing an animal, etc. Contact Mark or Jenn regarding one of these ideas or if you have one of your own.

Market Poultry Project

Meat birds will be part of the 4-H market animal program and 4-H Livestock Auction at the Hemlock Fair. This project is ideal for members interested in raising a market animal but may be restricted by space, facilities, or finances.

The meat bird project will follow the rules found in the 2026 4-H Livestock Sale Rules



Please read this document carefully before committing to the project! There are a couple of new rules highlighted in the document.

Exhibitors consigning market poultry only and no other species may sell 2 pens of 2 birds. Exhibitors consigning meat birds and another species may only sell 1 pen of 2 meat birds.

All participants will have to complete ONE Pre-Fair Educational Activity to be eligible to sell their meat birds at the fair!

All birds must be purchased through the 4-H program to be eligible for the meat bird project and sale.

New York State Guernsey Calf Scholarship

The Calf Scholarship Award Program is sponsored by the New York State Guernsey Breeders Association for the purpose of encouraging those who do not presently own Guernseys to become involved with the Guernsey Breed. A purebred Guernsey Calf will be awarded to the applicant who shows interest in the Guernsey breed and who has demonstrated the capabilities of developing the animal to its fullest potential. Applicant must be age 9 – 15 as of January 1st of the application year. You do not have to belong to 4 – H, FFA, or a breed club to participate. Applications are due March 1st. Cloverbud Corner



NO BAKE CINNAMON ORNAMENTS

Materials

1 cup ground cinnamon
1 cup applesauce
2 Tbsp. white glue
drinking straw (or large diameter treat stick)
ribbon or twine for hanging (optional)

Instructions

1. Mix cinnamon, spices (if using), applesauce, and glue in a large bowl until well blended. The mixture will become stiff. Use a little more applesauce if your mix isn't pliable (it should be like a pie or pizza dough).
2. Form the dough into a ball and place it on a sheet of wax or parchment paper. Let your little ones roll the dough to about 1/4 inch thick (3.5 cm).
3. Using cookie cutters, cut dough out in desired shapes. Our favorite Christmas spice ornaments are thicker shapes such as stars, bells, and trees.
4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 with leftover dough until you have used up as much dough as you can. There will be some left over you can use to make accent beads by rolling thick balls and piercing them with a skewer or thin straw.
5. For ornaments, use the straw to poke a hole at the top of your ornaments to thread the ribbon for hanging, keeping about 1/4 inch away from the top edge. If you're making magnets, skip this step.
6. Place ornaments on a flat surface to air dry; a cookie cooling rack works best. Let them dry for 48-72 hours, turning them over halfway through the drying period.
7. If you want to dry your DIY spice ornaments faster, place them in an oven at 200 degrees for about 2.5 hours.
8. Once they are dry, thread the ribbon or twine through the hole and tie in a knot.
