Tompkins Community Bank 4-H Livestock Scholarship Program Sponsored by Tompkins Community Bank

A committee with a minimum of 3 people will evaluate the applications for the livestock scholarship. Enrolled 4-H Members may apply for a scholarship to purchase a market or breeding animal in the swine, lamb or beef species. Funding for the scholarship will be donated annually by Tompkins Community Bank. The scholarship will be broken down as follows:

\$500 for a beef scholarship \$100 for a swine scholarship \$100 for a lamb scholarship

These amounts serve as a cap and the 4-H member does not keep the excess proceeds if the animal they select to purchase is less than the scholarship.

The applicant will be judged and given a score on the following components:

- 30 POINTS -- An essay written by the applicant explaining why they are interested in doing a livestock project through 4-H. The essay should also outline the 4-H'ers plans for housing, feeding, showing, and marketing the animal.
- 10 POINTS -- A recommendation from a 4-H leader or an active member of the agriculture industry endorsing the youth and outlining the reasons they believe the youth is deserving of the scholarship. **This cannot be from a parent**.
- 30 POINTS -- A score on a knowledge test consisting of 30 questions about the livestock industry, animal nutrition, genetics, showing and grooming, and careers in the agricultural industry.
- 30 POINTS -- An interview with a committee asking questions about the application, future plans, and goals for their 4-H project.

100 POINTS TOTAL

*The applicant's three (3) references will be contacted and a scheduled site visit to the animal's housing facility may be conducted by the committee.

Requirements for the Scholarship Winner:

- 1. The scholarship amounts serve as a cap and the 4-H member does not keep the excess proceeds if the animal they select to purchase is less than the scholarship.
- 2. If the project animal cost more than the scholarship, the difference will be the responsibility of the 4-H'er.
- 3. The Tompkins Community Bank 4-H Livestock Scholarships may be applied to either a market or breeding animal in each livestock species (swine, sheep, beef).
- 4. Scholarship animals must be shown at Hemlock Fair. Market animals must follow the *4-H Livestock Sale Rules*.
- 5. A thank you note must be sent to the funder of the scholarship within three weeks of receiving the scholarship.
- 6. The recipient must complete a project record on their scholarship animal to be turned in to the 4-H Office by the specified date.
- 7. The applicant must be an enrolled 4-H Member in Livingston County.
- 8. The application must be accompanied by the Parental Agreement.

Other Details:

- 9. Beef project animals must be owned by December 1st. Sheep and swine project animals must be owned by May 1st.
- 10. The 4-H Animal Science Educator must be notified when the animal is selected so arrangements can be made with the funder to reimburse payment.
- 11. **Each species scholarship is a one-time award per member**. One a member receives scholarship in a given specie, that member is no longer eligible to apply for that species scholarship.
- 12. Winners will be recognized at 4-H Achievement Day.
